President V.V.Giri, dissolved the Forth Lok Sabha on December 27th,1970 and ordered a mid-term poll as soon as possible. This was on the recommendation of Prime Minister Mrs.Indira Gandhi who had called on the President of an emergency meeting of the Cabinet convened by her in the evening. The opposition was not consulted and was not given a chance to test its strength. The cabinet met after the Congress Parlimentary Board had a session in the morning to consider the majority question of simulteneous elections being held for West Bengal, Tamilnadu and Orissa; Legislative Assembles together with a mid-term poll for Lok Sabha.

The President had accepted the Prime Ministers recommendations after a careful consideration. A Rastrapati Bhavan communique revealed that Mrs.Gandhi had first breached the subject to the President on Christmas Eve on her way to the Congress (R) working Committee, which gave her a mandate to go in for a mid-term poll. The Prime Minister told the President that the only consideration in seeking the dissolution was to enable the Government to implement effectively
